

Bennett Springs Hatchery Improvement Schedule

Andrew Branson also had a hand out concerning Bennett Springs Hatchery construction. A picture of the work and timeline is below.

Need For Improvements

- Improve staff and public safety
- Increase flood protection
- Increase fish rearing capacity
- Replace aging and obsolete infrastructure
- Improve fish waste handling system
- Improve building code compliance
- Improve ADA accessibility
- · Increase feed storage capacity and handling efficiency
- Address poor site access for operations · Improve water quality and flows to improve fish health
- Increase electrical service capacity · Improve site drainage and storm water control

Improve exterior lighting

Planned Timeline

- Advertise for bids, March 26, 2023
- Pre-bid meeting April 5, 2023
- Bid opening, April 26, 2023
- · Commission action, May 2, 2023
- · Construction period, 24 Months

What to Expect During Construction

- Bennett Spring State Park will remain open to the public
- · Fishing in the Spring Branch will be available to anglers
- · Public access within the construction limits will be restricted
- Temporary road closures will occur, detours will be provided · Expect sounds of construction and construction traffic

Summary of Improvements

- Demolition of select existing structures
- Site improvements including drainage upgrades and flood wall New Spring Branch intake structure with traveling screens
- Instrumentation upgrades
- Replacement of upper raceways for fish rearing
- Improvements to lower raceways
- Improvements to the existing hatchery building to add ultraviolet
- disinfection and water chilling
- Addition of bulk liquid oxygen system
- New backup generator
- Renovate hatchery office building
- Construction of new shop building
- Construction of new bulk feed storage building



<u>Proposal at Bennett Spring to add Fly Rods only and C&R</u> Section in Zone 1 – Survey is open March 25 – May 15, 2023

Also after Andrew's presentation it was brought up that this proposal is being considered and MDC has a survey on line until May 15th. MDC is asking if:

- 1. I support making Bennett Spring, from the spring to Holland Dam, fly and fly rod only (no spincasting, baitcasting, etc.).
- 2. I support making Bennett Spring, from the spring to Holland Dam, Catch and Release only.
 (the survey asks yes or no, and how strongly you agree or disagree and asks for comments.)

Stream Team Update

John Wenzlick, Phil and Greg Curtain, Uldis Pironis, Mike Dean and I dodged the thunderstorms and completed monitoring on Saturday, April 15th. We planned to meet at 6am, but Greg and I talked at 5:30 to consider the weather. Greg took a poll on going so we decided to leave at 6:30 and not go to Bennett to fish. Greg picked up donuts, carpooled with Phil, Mike and Uldis to meet John and me at the stream at 7. The sky looked threatening, so we geared up before having the donuts. We set up at our spot, completed chemical tests and the first insect sampling. Mike started counting time between the lightning and thunder to judge how far away the lightening was. We hustled through the second sampling, packed our gear and hustled to the vehicles in the rain. By the time we had donuts the storm appeared to be over, so we went back to our monitoring location for the third bug count and stream discharge.

We did not find large numbers of insects, but as with the last time there was a good distribution. Most were pollution intolerant (mayflies, caddis, stoneflies....) we even found a hellgrammite and a crane fly. A few years ago, I pulled a tire out of the stream below the low water bridge. This time Greg picked up one and Mike got the inner tube. John and I recycled the tire at Big-O. They charge \$4.50 but it beats having the trash at the stream. We always fill up at least one trash bag every trip out. Even though nitrates were very low as they have been there was more moss in the water than I have ever seen. There was so much, we had to continually clear it from the tape as were measuring stream discharge. Phil said the warmer winter may have been a factor. The other possible explanation is the 80+ degree days we had in March and April. I noted that on the data sheet I submitted so perhaps Stream Team will provide an explanation.

You may recall several of us monitored and fished last September. After monitoring Greg and I fished down a half mile or more. Phil and Lee fished up stream for a good distance too. In the past there were a fair number of nice smallmouths, but that day we did not even see fish. However, we talked to a couple fishermen who said they caught smallmouth last fall and were trying to again today. We asked them to post a picture on our web site if they caught one. I hope they are right.

Certification Opportunity

Level 2 and Validation trainings are combined starting Summer 2022. Monitors attending Level 2 for the first time will complete an online training prior to attending the in-person certification. A link to online training will be emailed after registration.

Level 2

The focus of the VWQM Level 2 training will be Quality Assurance/Quality Control (QA/QC) procedures to improve the quality of volunteer data. At this training, water samples will be analyzed in the classroom by monitors using their program-issued equipment. Attendees will also improve aquatic invertebrate identification skills.

PREREQUISITES TO ATTEND LEVEL 2:

Completion of VWQM Level 1 and submission of two seasons of data including biological, water chemistry, visual survey, and stream discharge. Greg and Doug have completed the prerequisites and are eligible to register.
