STREAM TEAM UPDATE

We planned to leave early September 17 to fish after monitoring. Per Phil's request, I bought BIG donuts from Schultes' when they opened at 6am. We car pooled to Big Saline Creek, ate donuts, picked up trash, put on waders and got set up to count macro-invertebrates by 7:30. Greg, Doug and Mike Dean counted bugs, while Phil and I did the chemical tests. Except for being the lowest we had ever seen the stream it was in good shape. We saw a couple fish and caught a minnow and a crayfish in the kick net. The number of insects was small consistent with a major decline that has been happening around the country for years, but diversity was good, a may fly, caddis, stone flies, water pennies, snails and even an alder fly. We also counted clams and aquatic worms. We don't often get shirts, but this time John got these stream team tees, so we could be quintuplets.





We finished up the stream discharge test by 8:30 and drove to Meramac Spring to fish. The five of us caught about 20 trout along with a couple sun fish. As you probably guessed, Greg contributed greatly to that number. The park was crowded and pretty warm, but shade and cool water made it pleasant. Overall a very productive and enjoyable day! Thanks to Phil for driving and to everyone for helping monitor. We will plan to fish somewhere again next time.
