

MESSAGE FROM THE PREZ



MOONSHINE AND WATERMELONS

<u>A teenaged fly-fisher's guide to growing up in</u> <u>the Ozarks</u> - <u>By Jo Schaper</u>

Moonshine and Watermelons, the story of a teen boy growing up fly fishing in the south central Ozarks, could be called a memoir, but really consists of coming of age vignettes, punctuated by the sort of learning not possible in school, nor under direct supervision of adults.

In this book, Mark arrives in the Ozarks as a greenhorn to country living, and begins the misadventures recounted here. His paternal grandparents unexpectedly find themselves raising a flatlander unaware that roosters have spurs, that church is required, and ingenuity has to take the place of hard cash. Both Gramps and Granny fly fish, and Van Patten becomes Gramps' willing but initially clueless student.

The hero of the book is Mark's friend Donald Ray, who instigates scrapes and is a willing partner in crime. That they managed to survive their teens Van Patten credits to a guardian angel, and Donald Ray's ability to figure a way through whatever they fell into (or out of). Van Patten is an entertaining writer and storyteller. I wish the book were a little fatter, since stories he skims over 'for another time" haunt the book.

If Tom Sawyer had been a real boy on Roubidoux Creek with a box of hand-tied chicken feather flies, he would have fit right in. Good read.
