All of my fishing has come during or after one of the events the club was involved in. After Women's Free Fishing Day, My dad and I went down and fished on Taneycomo in Branson. It was a fun trip and the Browns were moving up towards the dam. With the fly tying in good hands, I tried my hands at fishing the One Fly Contest at the Redington Home Waters event on the Niangua the next weekend. I did terribly during the contest, but later in the afternoon, I redeemed myself a little bit and caught 7 rainbows. My last trip after water quality testing on Saline Creek was down to Roubidoux Creek. Jeff Holzem, Steve Peters, and myself set out to catch some fish. Well, I did a lot more fishing than I did catching on that day. I caught one little chub and had what could have been a thousand chub hits. There were only a couple of times during the whole afternoon that I could say I saw a trout. Definitely not my day.

I am going back down to Branson next weekend with family and hope to get a little fishing in. Between the family activities and the potential weather, we will see what happens!

STREAM TEAM UPDATE

I hope you are getting out to enjoy these beautiful fall days. Several of us got out recently. On October 14th, Greg, Steve Peters, Rick Thom and Lenny Liebler did our water quality monitoring of Big Saline Creek. Lenny and Rick are master naturalists and Audubon members. Lenny tried to sign up for the November water quality class, but it was full.

The day was cool and damp, but we all enjoyed checking out the stream and looking for fish. We saw some small bass and many minnows. We even got a crawfish as we were sampling

macroinvertebrates. Two things really stood out, first, we found all of the insects that do not tolerate pollution, mayflies, caddis, alder flies, gilled snails, a stonefly and even a hellgrammite. This was the first time I think we ever found all of them. The other item was not good. Two more big trees with green leaves had fallen into the water, because the stream bank eroded. I got level 2 certification in 2014, and was monitoring a year or so before that. It is not surprising with the major drought that the water level was the lowest I have seen.

We have started a new tradition, fishing after monitoring. We tried Saline Creek and caught some sunfish in the past. It was a great smallmouth fishery years ago, but we have not found any for several years. This time Steve, Greg and I tried our luck at Roubidoux Creek. There was not much flow there either, so nymphing was very challenging. We did manage to land a couple trout, a couple sunfish, and some chubs, but it was a slow day.

ONE SEASON ENDS AND A NEW ONE BEGINS

As you all know, October 31st marks the last day of catch and keep season at the trout parks around Missouri. They will then close for a couple of weeks and reopen for the catch and release season. This is one of the best times to be at the parks because it means the crowds have lightened up. With the exception of Meramec Park, which I believe is open all week, the other parks are open Friday through Monday every week. The hours of operation are from 8 am to 4 pm on those days. Plenty of time for a full day of Fishing.

Now, if you do not want to go that far away from home or simply want to try somewhere different, don't forget about the winter stocking program that begins on November 1st all around Missouri. In Central Missouri you have cities like Jefferson City, Columbia, Fulton, Mexico, Moberly, Marshall, and Sedalia with stocked lakes. Not to mention if you go a little farther out, you have Union, Farmington, Kirksville and Beyond. CLUB BUSINESS

- 1) Membership renewals have now gone out. We are now taking the \$20 household membership fee for 2024. If you were not at the October meeting, you should have received a postcard in the mail as a reminder to pay your dues before January 1st 2024. You were also asked if you are a member of Fly Fishers International. If you are an FFI member, our dues to the organization will decrease. Checks can be made out to Capital City Fly Fishers or CCFF and sent to our Treasurer, Jack Kramer, via the address provided on the postcard.
- 2) Elections will take place at the November 14th members meeting. If you would like to be part of the Board of Directors or Officers there is still time. You can let me know any time up until the elections take place. Please be in attendance at the meeting to cast your vote.
- 3) Committees will need to be formed to help keep everything going. We will be looking for help in several areas. Here are some of those areas:
 - A) The most important committee will be the Banquet/Fundraising committee. This committee will have three board members and two regular members on it. This is a multi-year commitment. The process to select the committee starts once we have a new board and officers elected and their job begins on January 1st. With the decision to try and move the banquet back to the first quarter of the year, the group will only have to plan a members only banquet this year and have the entire year to get the fundraising banquet figured out.
 - B) There will need to be a Chairman and/or committee for the Summer Outings in May, June, and July. They will make sure all venues are booked/reserved, volunteers are arranged for cooking/supplying the main course (reimbursement given for main course), bring the proper supplies to the outings (some could be donated by members), and coordinate club member attendance to help determine counts and keep costs appropriate.
 - C) A decision was made to have a Kids Fishing event when the winter stocking program at McKay Park becomes catch and keep in February. If we are going to do this we will need to start to form a committee at the November meeting and start planning it out. What permissions are required? Who shall we try to include at the event(CFM, MDC, Parks and Rec, Sports Academy, FFI, etc.)? A lot to do.
 - D) We talked about writing up a grant to submit to the Conservation Federation of Missouri (CFM) and at this moment, to my knowledge, nothing has been started. We could use some help to get this rolling. The deadline for submission is December 15th, 2023. That is not very far away if we have to come up with a proposal to meet CFM guidelines and come up with an event or activity worthy.
 - *E)* These may be just some of the committees needed to keep things running effectively. We need everyone to get involved to make the club a success. Thanks!!!
- 4) As touched on in the committees section, we need to talk about possible dates to have the next non-fundraising banquet. Hopefully we have given Jack Kramer enough time to find a date.
- 5) Please let me know if you have any ideas to help improve the club! Maybe a new event, some website or facebook enhancements, or maybe a fundraising opportunity to spice things up. Remember that with new ideas also come new commitments. Be open to giving your time and effort.
